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FINAL REPORT

I. INTRODUCTION

The Council of Ministers of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) held its thirty-second ordinary session in the ECOWAS Secretariat Complex at Abuja on 4 and 5 December, 1992.

II. OPENING SESSION

- 3. The Minister of Finance and Economic Development of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Alhaji Ahmadu Abubakar welcomed all delegates to Nigeria and wished them an enjoyable stay in Abuja. The Honourable Minister stated that all Member States were currently passing through a period of immense economic, social and political stress. He made particular reference to such economic problems as the deteriorating terms of trade, chronic balance of payments deficits, acute shortage of foreign exchange and heavy indebtedness.
- The Minister added that the Community itself was facing 4. serious political problems because of the Liberian civil war. indicated that the Liberian crisis was also having the effect of diverting international attention away from the economic difficulties of West Africa. He hoped that these serious challenges would serve to bring Member States together to seek common solutions to their numerous problems and to pursue more vigorously the integration process.
- 5. In his opening address, the Chairman of Council Honourable Paul DOSSOU, Minister of Finance of the Republic of Bénin, highlighted some of the items on the agenda before Council to underscore the importance of the thirty-second session. He also reminded the meeting that extra-ordinary sessions of Council and the Authority would be held very soon to consider and adopt the Revised ECOWAS Treaty. The Chairman stated that the initiatives to strengthen the Community were very welcome, in view of the acute economic development problems of Member States, and the good examples of regional integration being shown in North America, Western Europe and the Pacific Rim.

6. The Chairman of Council gave a short account of the progress recorded by the Community in the implementation of the various integration programmes. He appealed to all Member States to ensure the effective application of the Minimum Agenda for Action which was adopted by the Authority in July 1992, and which the World Bank and IMF had undertaken to give their full support. In the same vein, the Chairman called for greater commitment to a coordinated regional approach to the mobilisation of external resources such as the Regional Fund of the Lomé IV Convention. He also exhorted Member States to clear all outstanding contributions to the Institutions of the Community to enable them undertake with vigour the growing number of duties assigned to them by the ECOWAS decision—making organs.

V. OUTCOME OF DELIBERATIONS

Item 1: Report of the Executive Secretary

- 9. The Executive Secretary, Dr. Abass BUNDU presented his Interim Report on the functioning of the Community since the annual statutory meetings in July 1992. The report contained an assessment of the West African economic environment, an account of the level of implementation of the different Community cooperation programmes, a review of ECOWAS mediation in the Liberian crisis, and an outline of the proposed Community Work Programme for 1993.
- 10. The Executive Secretary stated that regional integration in West Africa had been advancing at a rather modest pace; many vital regional issues had remained unresolved and continued to pose serious challenges. He cited the Liberian crisis as an example where the restoration of peace and democracy, and the reconstruction of the national economy, were matters that affected regional peace and security. He went on to say that the results of all regional cooperation and integration efforts would best be reflected in a free flow of goods and services across national

borders, and yet the Community was stumbling badly on the trade liberalisation scheme. He also stated that although much had been said about promoting the integration of the regional production base, a lot remained to be achieved in concrete terms.

- 11. The Executive Secretary acknowledged that Member States had sacrificed scarce resources to keep ECOWAS alive and enable it record some progress. He expressed the belief however that Member States would benefit much more, individually and collectively, from their participation in regional integration if certain attitudes changed and the basic problems facing West African integration were addressed with more vigour. He stated that an opportunity to make a start on this was being offered through the ECOWAS Treaty review. Dr. Bundu stressed that West African countries had no better alternative approach to the development of their economies than regional integration and the proposals of the Committee of Eminent Persons pointed the way forward to a more effective regional integration arrangement.
- 12. After the presentation, Council congratulated the Executive Secretary for the high quality of the Interim Report. Council took note of the report after a brief exchange of views on some of the issues raised therein.

Item 2: Report on the Meeting of the Board of Directors

13. The Managing Director of the ECOWAS Fund, Mr. Mahenta B. Fall presented this item on the Agenda. The Managing Director explained that there had been no meeting of the Board of Directors as the political situation in Togo had made it impossible for the officials of the Fund to travel from Lomé for the November/December statutory meetings in Nigeria. He conveyed to Council the apologies of the Togolese Minister of Finance and the Economy whose

delegation, for the same reason, had been unable to attend the current statutory meetings.

- 14. The Managing Director invited Council to endorse the recommendation of the Administration and Finance Commission that until the draft 1993 Budget of the ECOWAS Fund is examined and approved, Article 008 of the Financial Regulations should apply; that is, the Managing Director of the Fund should be authorised "to continue to carry out operations in respect of receipts and expenditure on the basis of the last approved budget...The amount paid per month and per heading shall not exceed 1/12 of the total amount of the funds under this heading in the preceding financial year". Mr. Fall expressed the hope that the situation in Togo would normalise very soon to allow a meeting of the Board to be convened in Lome well before 31 March 1993.
- 15. Council took note of the above information given by the Managing Director of ECOWAS Fund, particularly concerning the security of the personnel of the Fund and of their families, as well as the problem that the interruption of the education of their children might pose. Coucil expressed sympathy with the staff of the Fund and also expressed the wish that the socio-political situation in Togo would return to normal as soon as possible.

Item 3: Reports of the Technical Commissions

(i) Report of the Meeting of the TCIMP Commission

16. The report of the twenty-ninth meeting of the Trade, Customs, Immigration, Money and Payments, and Tourism Commission was presented by the Chairman of the Commission. During the presentation, attention was drawn to the recommendations made by the Commission to Council on the following issues:

- (i) 1993 Compensation Budget
- (ii) ECOWAS Harmonised Immigration and Emigration Form
- (iii) Agreement on the Use of Local Currencies by Community Citizens in connection with travel within the Region
 - (iv) Adoption of Short and Medium-Term Trade Promotion Programme in ECOWAS
- 17. Council considered the issues dealt with in the report of the Commission. At the end of its consideration, Council approved the report together with the recommendations contained therein, subject to the following observations:
- (a) The Executive Secretariat was requested to prepare a complete list of all industrial products and enterprises so far approved under the ECOWAS Trade Liberalisation Scheme and make it available to all Member States for wide dissemination among the business community; and
 - (b) Under the Minimum Agenda for Action, all Community citizens who present at entry points passports of Member States or the ECOWAS Travel Certificate should be exempted from filling immigration forms. Member States which, as an exceptional case, institute the application of the Harmonised Immigration Form, should communicate to the Executive Secretariat the exceptional circumstances that justify the filling of the immigration form.
 - (ii) Report of the Meeting of the Administration and Finance Commission
- 18. After the presentation of the report of the tenth meeting of the Administration and Finance Commission by its chairman, Council approved the report and the accompanying recommendations. In

adopting the report of the Commission, Council made the following decisions:

- (a) the provisions of Article 008 of the Financial Regulations should be applied to enable the ECOWAS Fund function till the consideration and approval of its 1993 operational budget.
- (b) the Executive Secretariat should request Cape Verde and Guinea-Bissau to propose before the end of June 1993 three candidates each for the Trade Information (P4) and Money and Payments (P5) posts respectively allocated to the two Member States, and which had remained unfilled. If the posts remain unfilled after June 1993, they should be advertised throughout the region and filled through open competition, in accordance with Article 11 (4) of the Staff Regulations.
- (c) an amount of 9,387,529 UA was approved for the 1993 budget for compensation of loss of revenue arising from the application of the ECOWAS trade liberalisation scheme in respect of all industrial products approved since 1990. Of the amount approved, the Member States that submitted new products would have to contribute only 4,905,500 UA relating to the 52 new products approved for 1993.
- (d) Senegal agreed to lift its reservation on the recruitment of a typist for the Trade, Customs, Immigration, Money and Payments Department at the request of the Executive Secretary provided the typist was recruited on a temporary basis for a period of one year pending the completion of the evaluation of all existing posts in the Community.

- (e) Council considered the request of Burkina Faso for the regularisation of the administrative status Dieudonné Bassinga, the former Manager of the Community Computer Project, who now wished to be given a permanent post in the Institutions of the Community. Council examined all the technical aspects of the matter and concluded that the issue at stake was rather one of recruitment into the Institutions of the Community and not of regularisation of the position of an employee already in post. Such recruitment must comply with the Staff Regulations. However, as an exceptional case which must not be regarded as a precedent, Council agreed to make a political decision on this matter. WAS decided that post, commensurate with a Mr. Bassinga's relevant qualification and experience, be found for him anywhere else in the Institutions of the Community and that the Executive Secretary should determine the level of the post, after consultation with the Chairman of Council, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Staff Regulations.
- (f) Council approved an operational budget of the Executive Secretariat for the 1993 Financial Year balanced out at 8,120,600 UA, in income and expenditure, representing a 7.22% increase over the 1992 budget.

Item 4: Status of Ratification of ECOWAS Protocols and Conventions

19. Council expressed satisfaction with the progress made by most Member States concerning the ratification of Community Acts and Decisions. Council appealed to those Member States which were yet

to complete the ratification of these instruments, to endeavour to do so as soon as possible.

20. Council noted that many Community Acts and Decisions had remained unimplemented and therefore called on every Member State to make every effort to ensure the effective implementation of all Community Acts and Decisions at national level.

Item 5: Status of Financial Contributions

- 21. Council took note of the report made by the Executive Secretary to the effect that only Benin, Burkina Faso and Nigeria had paid all their outstanding contributions to the budget of the Executive Secretariat. Council made a strong appeal to the Member States which had not yet settled their arrears to make a diligent effort to meet their financial obligations to the Executive Secretariat and the ECOWAS Fund without further delay.
 - 22. In order to facilitate the settlement of the outstanding contributions, Council requested the Executive Secretariat and the ECOWAS Fund to notify each Member State, at the beginning of each financial year, the amount of contribution expected from it and the necessary information especially on the banks into which the payments should be made.

Item 6: Transfer of the Executive Secretariat to Abuja

23. The Executive Secretary informed Council that the host government of the Community had written requesting the Executive Secretariat to move to Abuja as soon as possible. Dr. Bundu recalled that it was the lack of staff accommodation which was holding up the movement to Abuja. He informed Council further that the efforts so far made by the Institutions of the Community to

mobilise financial resources for the construction of staff quarters in Abuja had not met Council's approval. This situation had led the Executive Secretary to approach the Nigerian authorities for possible assistance.

- 24. The Executive Secretary informed Council that he had requested a loan of about \$13 million interest-free from the Nigerian authorities. Dr. Bundu was, therefore, seeking the formal approval of Council to continue and conclude these discussions with the Nigerian authorities.
- 25. In anticipation of a successful outcome of the discussions with the Nigerian authorities, and to gain time, the Executive Secretary made the following proposals to Council:
 - the architects and contractors for the headquarters building, AIM Consultants and SGEN respectively, which had given very satisfactory service, should be engaged to design and construct the staff quarters;
 - the sketch drawings done by AIM Consultants for the approval of the Ad Hoc Ministerial Committee in 1990 should be adopted so that AIM Consultants could proceed to do the working drawings of the quarters and the site which had earlier been donated to the Community by the Nigerian authorities.
 - the construction of the staff quarters should be undertaken in phases; the first phase would cost \$13 million and would comprise the quarters for the Professional Staff and a limited number of units for the "G" category of staff. Subsequent phases would be undertaken as additional funds become available;

- a 3-member technical committee should be appointed to oversee the project, comprising of highly competent architects from Benin, Nigeria and Togo. (These Member States constituted the Sub-Committee that did a similar technical job in connection with the construction of the Headquarters building); and
- the fees of the consultants should be the same percentage of the approved cost of construction of staff quarters as was in the case of the construction of the Headquarters building.
- 26. Dr Eundu ended the presentation by stating that these proposals were meant to save time (normal tendering procedure would have taken 12 to 15 months to complete), retain the services of firms which had performed creditably in the past, and reduce to the minimum incidental costs which would otherwise eat into the loan sum.
- 27. Council congratulated the Executive Secretary for this initiative, and urged him to pursue the negotiations with the Nigerian authorities. Council requested the Executive Secretary to prepare an appropriate memorandum on the matter for consideration at an extra-ordinary session of Council to be convened for this purpose upon successful conclusion of the negotiations with the Nigerian Government.

Item 7: Any Other Matters

28. The delegations of Benin, Guinea and Niger informed Council that a Department for African Economic Integration had been set up

within their respective Governmental machineries. The delegations appealed to the Institutions of the Community to extend assistance to these new national Departments to enable them become operational. Council expressed its appreciation for this initiative and called on the Community Institutions to take the necessary steps to assist these three Member States as requested.

29. The Chairman of Council informed the meeting that consultations were being made among the Heads of State and Government to agree on dates for the extra-ordinary sessions of Council and the Authority being convened for the adoption of the Revised ECOWAS Treaty.

VI. Adoption of Report

30. This Report was adopted.

VII. CLOSING SESSION

- 31. The Chairman of Council thanked members for their invaluable contributions to the deliberations and commended the Executive Secretariat for the high quality of the documents submitted to it.
- 32. The Chairman recalled some of the important issues which came up for discussion during this session. He referred in particular to the issue of security in the sub-region, a pre-requisite for the development of the Community, and the plight of the staff of the ECOWAS Fund at this time when the country in which they work is going through a difficult phase.

33. The Chairman concluded by wishing Council members a safe return to their countries and declared closed the thirty-second ordinary session of the Council of Ministers.

THE COUNCIL OF MINISTERS,

MINDFUL of Article 6 of the ECOWAS Treaty establishing the Council of Ministers and defining its composition and functions:

MINDFUL of the Protocol A/P.1/5/79 relating to the free movement of persons, residence and establishment;

MINDFUL of the provisions of Decision A/DEC.5/7/92 on the Minimum Agenda for Action requesting Member States to remake all forms of administrative barriers to the free movement of persons and goods;

MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC.2/7/87 relating to the adoption of an ECOWAS Monetary Cooperation Programme aimed at achieving in the short-term regional currency convertibility through the increased use of local currencies for intra-regional payments transactions;

MINDFUL of the efforts being made by Member States under structural adjustment to liberalise exchange controls and payments restrictions:

CONVINCED that an agreement among Member States to use and accept local currencies for making payment for services rendered in connection with intra-Community travel will facilitate the integration process;



DECIDES

Article 1

Member States shall create the enabling environment for Community citizens to pursue their legitimate activities by removing all forms of restrictions including administrative restrictions.

Article 2

No discriminatory measures shall be applied by Member States against Community citizens with regard to the use of local currencies to pay for services rendered while travelling within the sub-region.

Article 3

Member States shall allow the use of local currencies by Community citizens to pay for services rendered, such as airpart service charges, hotel bills and purchase of air tickets.

Article 4

The Executive Secretariat shall monitor the implementation of this Decision and make periodic reports to Council:

Article 5

This Decision shall enter into force upon signature and shall be published in the Official Journal of the Community and in the National Gazette of each Member State.

LIBERALISATION SCHEME FOR INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTS ORIGINATING FROM
ECOWAS MEMBER STATES

THE COUNCIL OF MINISTERS,

MINDFUL of Article 6 of the ECOWAS Treaty establishing the Council of Ministers and defining its composition and functions;

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MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC.8/5/79 dated 29 May 1979 of the Authority of Heads of State and Government relating to the consolidation of import duties taxes of equivalent effect and non-tariff barriers;

MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC.19/5/80 dated 28 May, 1980 of the Authority of Heads of State and Government relating to the application of compensation procedures for loss of revenue suffered by ECOWAS Member States as a result of the trade liberalisation programme;

MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC/1/5/83 dated 30 May, 1983 of the Authority of Heads of State and Government relating to the adoption and implementation of a single trade liberalisation scheme for industrial products originating from Member States of the Community;

MINDFUL of Article 1 of Decision A/DEC.6/6/89 dated 30 June, 1989 of the Authority of Heads of State and Government fixing the 1st of January 1990 as the implementation date for the trade liberalisation scheme for industrial products originating from Member States of the Community;

MINDFUL of Decisions C/DEC.6/12/88, C/DEC.2/5/90 and C/DEC.5/7/92 of the Council of Ministers establishing the list of industrial products eligible to benefit under the trade liberalisation scheme;

ON THE RECOMMENDATION of the Trade, Customs, Immigration, Money and Payments Commission which met in Lagos from 12 to 14 November 1992;

ON THE ADVICE of the Administration and Finance Commission which met in Lagos from 24 to 29 November 1992.

DECIDES

Article 1

H

An amount of nine million, three hundred and eighty-seven thousand, five hundred and twenty-nine Units of Accounts (9,387,529 UA) is hereby approved for the 1993 compensation budget for loss of revenue arising from the application of the ECOWAS trade liberalisation scheme in respect of industrial products approved since 1990.

Article 2

Contributions due for the fifty-two (52) new products approved for the year 1993 amount to four million nine hundred and five thousand, five hundred units of account (4,905,500 UA).

DECISION C/DEC.3/12/92 ON THE INTRODUCTION OF A HARMONISED IMMIGRATION AND EMIGRATION FORM IN ECOWAS MEMBER STATES

THE COUNCIL OF MINISTERS,

MINDFUL of Article 6 of the ECOWAS Treaty establishing the Council of Ministers and defining its composition and functions;

MINDFUL of Protocol A/P.1/5/79 dated 29 May, 1979 relating to free movement of Persons, Right of Residence and Establishment;

MINDFUL of Decision A/DEC.5/7/92 dated 29 July 1992 of the Authority of Heads of State and Government mandating the Executive Secretariat to prepare a specimen of the harmonised immigration and emigration form;

CONSIDERING the crucial role of the Protocol on Free Movement of Persons, Right of Residence and Establishment in the West African integration process;

CONVINCED that, the adoption of a harmonised Community immigration and emigration form will facilitate and simplify cross-border formalities in Member States;

DRCIDES

Article 1

- 1. (a) There is hereby established a harmonised immigration and emigration form hereinafter referred to as the "Immigration and Emigration Form of ECOWAS Member States".
 - (b) The form shall be a rectangular card measuring 15cm x 9cm and containing several carbon copies.
- 2. (a) The form shall be used by citizens of the Community only in exceptional cases. The first sheet shall be detached and kept at the first border post after verification of the information contained therein.
 - (b) After the stamped copy has been removed, the rest of the form shall be released to the traveller for presentation at subsequent border posts.
- 3. The accronym "ECOWAS/CEDEAO", the ECOWAS logo and the name of the Member State (Republic of) shall be printed at the top of the booklet leaves.

Article 2

The immigration and emigration form shall be printed and issued free of charge by the competent authorities of each Member State

Article 3

The specimen of the form is annexed to this Decision.

Article 4

Member States shall take all necessary statutory and administrative measures to ensure the prompt implementation of this Decision.

Article 5

This Decision shall enter into force upon signature and shall be published in the Official Journal of the Community and in the National Gazette of each Member State.

TRADE PROMOTION PROGRAMME

I. INTRODUCTION

t: The aim of formulating an ECOWAB trade policy and trade promotion programme would be to open domestic markets by creating the necessary conducive regional environment for the business community to exploit.

Objectives

1. Short-Term:

To strengthen and increase intra-ECOWAS trade by stimulating production and trade development, and to enhance trade by creating awareness of market opportunities in the sub-region to the business community.

2. **Medium-Term:** To develop trade channels, trade services and human resources, in support of market integration.

3. Measures to achieve the objective

In order to achieve these objectives, Member States should be willing to co-operate in the trade promotion activities: The following measures are to be undertaken:-

- (a) implementation of liberal trade palisies to stable economic environment for trade opportunities;
- (b) provision of incentives to the business community for export activities.

II. DETAILS OF ACTIVITIES

A. Short-Term

(i) Supply and Demand Surveys

Market surveys to be undertaken for the following priority products during the period 1993 to 1995.

- 1993 (a) Canned tuna,
 - (b) Vegetable oils,
- 1994 (c) Jute sacks,
 - (d) Ceramic tiles,
- 1995 (e) Medicament for human uses/veterinary medicaments,
 - (f) Agricultural chemicals.

(ii) Buyer, Seller Meetings

Buyer/Seller meetings to be held according to the following schedule:-

- 1993 (a) Canned tuna,
 - (b) Vegetable oils,
- 1994 (c) Jute sacks,
 - (d) Ceramic tiles.
- 1995 (e) Medicament for human uses/veterinary medicaments,
 - (f) Agricultural chemicals.

(iii) Workshops

A number of annual workshops with the following themes are to be organised:-

- 1993 Training: A Foundation of Trade Promotion
- 1994 Project Financing
- 1995 Legal Aspects of Trade and Marketing Policies

(iV) Seminars

ECOWAS would collaborate with national trade promotion institutions to organise the following seminars with the proposed themes:

1994 - Trade opportunities in the sub-region

1995 - Some measures in support of ECOWAS trade expansion.

crade expansion

(v) <u>Handbook</u>

The preparation of a handbook on legal, financial and economic framework of Member States which will be up-dated every two years.

(vi) Fora

ECOWAS would assist the Federation of West African Chambers of Commerce to organise special action groups among enterprises, financial institutions and other trade related organisations interested in promoting specific projects. The fora will provide an opportunity to involve the private sector in the planning and implementation of ECOWAS policies.

(vii) Trade Information Network

To set up an ECOWAS Trade Information Network to provide data on raw materials, intermediate inputs, annual supply and demand situation as well as consumption pattern.

(viii) Trade Directory

The Secretariat, in collaboration with the International Trade Centre (ITC), will complete a trade directory on company profiles of exporters and importers in the sub-region based on data collected in the market surveys and buyers/seller meetings of selected products.

B. Medium-Term

The activities of the medium-term objective would involve:-

- the improvement of products quality;
- development of links and contacts between the business community and trade promotion institutions;
- the up-grading of manpower resources.

Harmonised Rules and Regulations on Packaging, Labelling and Marking of Goods.

Organisation of a meeting of experts to review the study on the harmonisation of regulations on packaging, labelling and marking of goods in ECOWAS with a view to ensuring implementation of harmonised rules and regulations.

(ii) <u>Development of Standardisation</u>, <u>Quality Control</u>, <u>Certification and Metrology Activities</u>

The establishment of a coordinating unit in the ECOWAS Secretariat would help to promote sharing of testing, metrology and instrumentation services among Member States.

(iii) Establishment of a Centre for Handicraft Products

The setting up of a Centre for handicraft activities in the sub-region in order to improve production methods, new product lines and introduce modern marketing methods. It would coordinate sectoral handicraft development as well as provide advisory services.

(iv) Trade Contacts

The expansion of the scope of existing trade information network by establishing contacts and promoting information flows among trading organisations, such as commercial enterprises, export and marketing bodies to link-up with other sub-regional institutions in Africa.

(v) Trade Documentation

A study on inventory of trade documentation process in each Member State to be undertaken, with a view to simplifying and harmonising documentation procedures and aligning the documents to meet international standards.

(vi) Training

Organisation of training programmes to improve the skills of national trade promotion officials by utilising existing educational institutions available in the sub-region.

(vii) Trade Fairs

Organisation of a four (4) yearly ECOWAS Trade Fair with participation of all Member States.

Article 1

The budget of the Executive Secretariat for the 1993 financial year, balanced out in revenue and expenditure at eight million, one hundred and twenty thousand, six hundred units of account (8,120,600 U.A.), is hereby approved.

Article 2

An amount of Seven million, six hundred and seventy-eight thousand, one hundred Units of account (7,678,100 U.A.) shall be

derived from the annual contributions of Member States while the balance of four hundred and forty-two thousand, five hundred units of account (442,500 U.A.) shall be obtained from internal resources.

Article 3

This Decision shall enter into force upon signature and shall be published in the Official Journal of the Community and in the National Gazette of each Member State.
